# Great Providers Advocate: Acuity-Based Rates

In order to advocate, you have to stay informed. As DODD's Waiver Modernization work moves forward, it's important to understand key concepts, like acuity-based rates.

Acuity-based rates are payment structures that adjust based on an individual's assessed level of need or "acuity." Rather than paying the same amount for a service regardless of complexity, the system would pay higher rates for individuals with more significant needs and lower rates for those who need less support.

The goal is to better match funding with the true cost of care — but getting there requires a reliable, fair assessment tool, adequate base rates, and a thoughtful transition strategy. Done well, acuity-based rates can support provider sustainability and person-centered service delivery. Done poorly, they risk destabilizing services for people with high needs.

That's why OPRA is watching this work closely and advocating for transparency and fairness every step of the way.



## **Waiver Modernization: Assessments & Rates**

If you've attended any recent Waiver Modernization Workgroup meetings or tuned into OPRA updates, you've likely heard about DODD's plan to replace both the Developmental Disabilities Profile (DDP) and the Acuity Assessment Instrument (AAI) with a new tool: the interRAI. This is more than just a swap of assessment forms — it's part of a larger shift toward acuity-based rates in Ohio's developmental disabilities system.
